

II. Monthly Program Updates

1. Community Engagement Update

Director of Community Engagement and Involvement Jackie Nirenberg provided the update.

The Community Engagement team wrapped up virtual community meetings, held April 26-May 21, with a total participation of 1,528 residents. The Community Advisory Committee also met in May, and the Orange and Blue Line working groups have launched. Jackie talked about the feedback received from the CAC working groups and publics . The next round of meetings is in July.

2. Project Connect Technical Update

Dave Couch, Chief Program Officer, provided this update.

Dave provided an update about the Red Line and Pick up services, Park & Rides, and neighborhood circulators. The 15% Design Package for the Blue Line and revisions for final submittal is underway. The 15% Design Package for the Orange Line is complete. The FTA has published the Notice of Intent in the Federal Register.

3. Administrative Program Update

Director of Human Resources Juliana Harris and Greg Canally, CFO & Development Officer, provided this update.

Since the previous Board Meeting, the Human Resources team has made eight new hires, adding 96 years of experience. Greg introduced Vicky Redrick. Vicky is developing the procurement manual, which will come to the Board at a future meeting. Greg also introduced Diane Siler. Diane discussed the budget framework.

Executive Director Randy Clarke provided his monthly report.

Randy discussed the new Dessau Pickup zone launch. The Dessau Pickup is the first project in the Project Connect Program to start in service officially. South Manchaca and Oak Hill are on schedule to begin this summer. The Joint Partnership Agreement (JPA) is to be addressed in future Board Meetings as staff works to develop it. A tri-party work session will take place in the fall. Additionally, the Community Advisory Committee and the Technical Advisory Committees will also discuss the JPA in the next few months.

DIVERSITY, EQUITY, AND INCLUSION POLICY STATEMENT

The Austin Transit Partnership (ATP) is committed to diversity, equity, and inclusion in the delivery of the Project Connect program by the ATP organization, and to demonstrating such commitment with transparency and accountability. Further, we are committed to developing strategies and tools to demonstrate such transparency and accountability based upon the commitments set forth in this Policy Statement and measurable outcomes, including as part of ATP's accountability dashboard. The ATP Board of Directors will continue to monitor and review the policy on an annual basis, at a minimum, and update the policy upon material change of the underlying process, as needed. SUBJECT: Approval of a resolution authorizing the Executive Director, or his designee, to enter into an interlocal agreement, and to register its domain (austintransitpartnership.org) with U.S. General Services Administration (GSA) Advantage, for the purpose of participating in cooperative procurement opportunities via the GSA Cooperative Purchasing Program.

FISCAL IMPACT: No Fiscal Impact.

BUSINESS CASE: The domain registration and approval will allow Austin Transit Partnership to use the GSA approved schedules to purchase goods and services under a pool of contracts that have been competitively procured by GSA. This action has the potential to expedite purchases, provide lower prices for goods and services, and avoid duplication of efforts. The immediate benefit to ATP will be the purchase of licenses for eBuilder project management software.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: The purpose of this cooperative agreement is to streamline and simplify compliance under Section 211 of the Government Act of 2002, which includes Public Law 107-347 for cooperative purchasing, and Public Law 110-248 for disaster purchasing. ATP can authorize and access GSA cooperative contracts, eliminating the need to go through the formal procurement process.

RESPONSIBLE DEPARTMENT: Procurement

PROCUREMENT SUMMARY: Using cooperative agreements will create procurement efficiencies by streamlining the purchase process, saving both time and money. The cooperatives have gone through the procurement process and the contracts have been awarded to qualified vendors. There is no cost to join and joining does not create a purchasing obligation or liability.

ATP will follow the guidelines of its procurement policy in relation to purchasing from the various cooperatives. ATP will also be responsible for ensuring that any purchase orders have applicable clauses for local, state, and federal procurements. In addition, ATP will be responsible for ensuring that the purchase orders comply with minority participation goals.

WHEREAS, Chapter 791 of the Texas Government Code, the Interlocal Cooperation Act, authorizes local governments to contract, to the greatest possible extent, with one another and agencies of the State of Texas, and the federal government; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 271 of the Texas Local Government Code permits local governments to form purchasing cooperatives to engage in cooperative purchasing for the benefit of all parties; and

WHEREAS, Section 211 of the Government Act of 2002, which includes Public Law 107-347 for cooperative purchasing, and Public Law 110-248 for disaster purchasing, authorize local government entities to access GSA cooperative contracts; and

WHEREAS, the GSA Cooperative Purchasing Program (Cooperative) is a purchasing cooperative made up of local government members that allows members to purchase goods and services under the GSA's competitively procured contracts; and

WHEREAS, by entering into the Cooperative Purchasing Agreement, an interlocal agreement with the U.S. General Services Administration, and by registering ATP's domain, Austin Transit Partnership will become a member of the Cooperative and gain access to a large pool of competitively procured contracts, which has the potential to expedite purchases, provide lower prices for goods and services, and avoid duplication of efforts.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Austin Transit Partnership Board of Directors that the Executive Director, or his designee, is authorized to enter into the Cooperative Purchasing







ORANGE & BLUE LINE – KEY MILESTONES (2021 – 2022)









THE 1839 WALLER PLAN: THE ORIGINAL PLAN FOR AUSTIN



The original Austin plan positioned the new city between Shoal and Waller creeks, fronting the Colorado River — laying out a clear grid of streets and four public squares – Republic, Brush, Wooldridge, and Hamilton - and organized around the central spine and civic axis of Congress Avenue.










1871–1902: THE GREAT PASSENGER RAILROADS








A system of 10 streetcar lines branched out to all parts of the growing city from its hub on Congress Avenue.

Project Connect recognizes the impacts of this and other planning efforts and seeks to bring a more inclusive, equitable planning approach to Austin's future.



Tunnel options south of Lady Bird Lake: where to come to the street



- 1 The tunnel beneath Lady Bird Lake must be deep enough to be in bedrock. At this depth, daylighting just south of Lady Bird Lake is infeasible.
- 2
- The next surfacing opportunity is not possible due to several major intersections and the 100-year floodplain at Riverside.
- 3
- The Bouldin Creek floodplain impedes daylighting north of the creek.



As the tunnel begins to slope up, so does the South Congress hill! There is an additional technical challenge of "chasing grade". Therefore, the first possible location to daylight is around Nellie / Academy Street.
